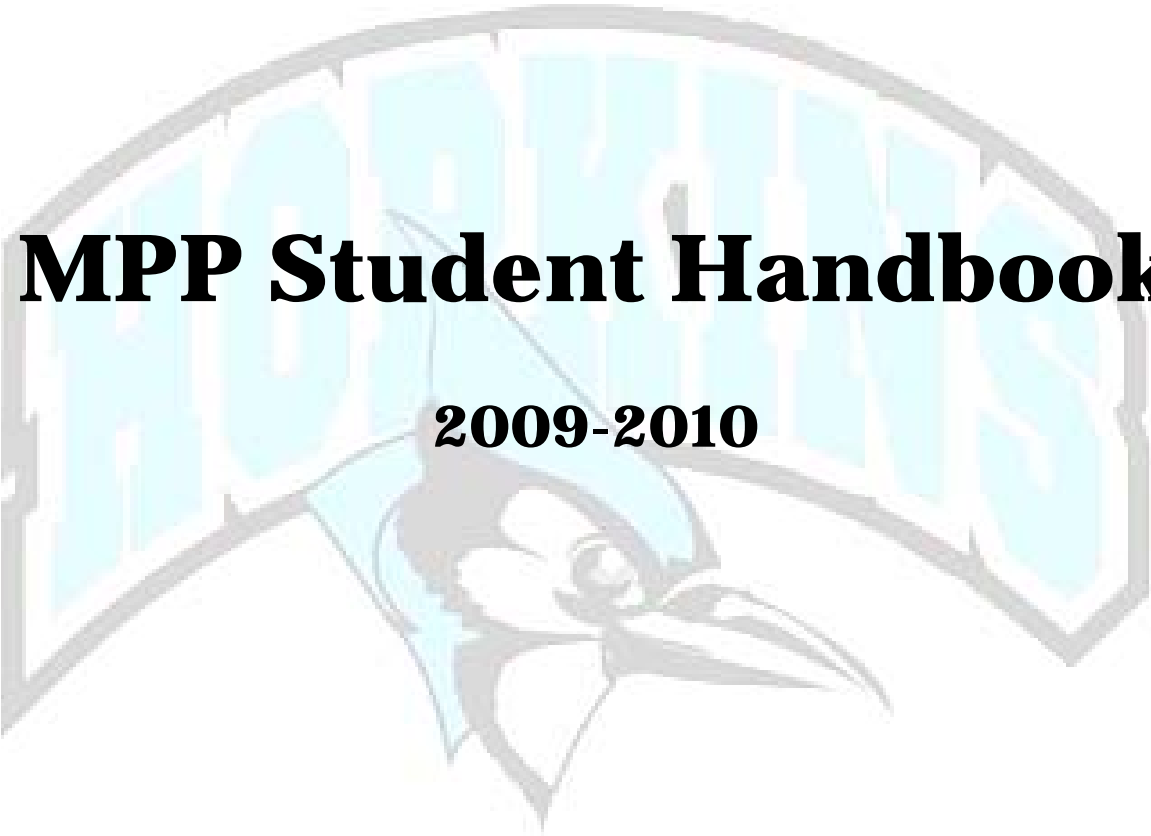


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Introduction

In the School of Arts & Sciences and Engineering (the main school on the Homewood Campus) there are approximately 4,555 undergraduate students and 1,625 graduate students.

Our academic colors are blue and sable and our athletic colors are light blue and black. Our mascot is the Blue Jay.

The pride of the Homewood campus is our Division I lacrosse program. The men's team won the NCAA championships in 2005 and 2007.

Every year, Hopkins undergraduates host the largest student-run fair in the country, Spring Fair. Spring Fair features rides, carnival food, vendors, big-name concerts, and a beer garden.

Campus Resources

Career Center

Set up your Career Center account. This can be done in-person or online, but it is crucial for accessing the available resources. These include:

- On-Campus Recruiting and Resume Drops (with many employers in the public service sector);
- Appointments with Career Counselors;
- J-Connect (a search engine for jobs and internships);
- Emails alerting students about career fairs, internship/job offers, and other special events;
- Access to In-Circle, the networking website for Hopkins students and alumni;
- Online documents on how to write a CV, cover letter, interview etiquette, and more.

Speaker Symposiums

Hopkins undergraduates run two renowned speaker series: the Milton S. Eisenhower Symposium in the fall, which focuses on domestic issues; and the Foreign Affairs Symposium in the spring. Speakers have included Bill Nye the Science Guy, Rory Kennedy, Danny Glover, Paul Rusesabagina (the inspiration for the film *Hotel Rwanda*), Robert Kagan, John Bolton, and many more. All events are free and well-advertised.

IPS has its own yearlong seminar series – attending these events will count for your seminar credits and will be announced at the beginning of the school year and as events are scheduled.

Graduate Representative Organization (GRO)

The GRO is a great way for all graduate students on the Homewood Campus to get to know one another. The group organizes events, provides an outlet for complaints, and is a good resource. Their web address is <http://www.jhu.edu/gro/>.

Discounts Offered to Hopkins Students

Museums: Free entry into the Baltimore Museum of Art (on the Homewood campus) and Walters Art Museum. All of the special exhibits that require an entrance fee are still free to students!

Shopping: J. Crew offers 15% discounts on all purchases when you present your students ID. This is particularly helpful when it comes time to prepare for summer internship interviews.

Loans, Scholarships, & Other Funding Opportunities

Student Loans

The student loan office administers federal aid programs and some state aid programs. They also offer loan consolidation consultations (the student must go to www.loanconsolidation.ed.gov and read the information first), which can be a good option after leaving school if you have loans under higher interest rates.

Federal aid available to grad students takes the form of low-interest loans and work-study. Options include **Federal Work-Study (FWS)**, **Federal Perkins Loan** (not available for part-time grads), and **Federal Direct Loan** (formerly Federal Stafford Loan) programs. The FWS program does not give you funds directly; rather, it helps you get part-time work on campus by paying a portion of your salary. Perkins and Federal Direct loans are straightforward programs. To qualify for these programs you must be a registered, full-time student and a United States citizen or permanent resident. To get any kind of federal aid you must show financial need. However, since all graduate students are now considered to be independent, it is unlikely you'll be denied a loan unless you have substantial assets or outside income. Note: Non-resident students are considered full-time for the purpose of federal aid consideration. However, they do not qualify for FWS funds because they are not officially allowed to work on campus.

Additional Resources for Locating Funding

The **Research Projects Administration**, (Suite W-400, Wyman Park Center, 410-516-8668, <http://jhuresearch.jhu.edu/rpa/>), provides a listing of grant and fellowship opportunities and maintains an online national database of grants for all disciplines. The staff can help you run a directed search targeting grants geared to your research interests. The **Office of Academic Advising** (410-516-8216), 3rd Floor Garland, focuses on undergraduates, but also provides graduate students with information about fellowships for study abroad. Possibilities include Rhodes, Marshall, St. Andrew's, Fulbright, Luce, Churchill, and DAAD grants. To learn more about any of these, stop by the office. NAGPS maintains a body of information regarding grants, fellowships and scholarships, as well as other financial aid information. Access to this information is restricted to members of NAGPS, but because the GRO is a member organization, all students at Homewood are entitled to this resource. Contact NAGPS to receive a password.

Conference Funding Assistance

Conference funding assistance was designed by the Institute for Policy Studies' Student Association (IPSSA) to offset the cost of attending academic and professional conferences. The funding is designed to encourage students to pursue additional opportunities to enhance their knowledge base in their area of interest or specialty and their skills portfolio. Students may only receive funds for one event annually and awards will be made at a fifty (50) percent match rate,

up to \$100, to successful conference applicants. Students may apply by submitting the *Conference Funding Application* to the Assistant Director.

Jobs on Campus

There are lots of opportunities for work both on and off-campus. Unfortunately, many on campus jobs don't pay very well and some require you to be eligible for work-study money (see federal aid above). If you do want a campus job, the first thing to do is ask around your department. If nothing comes through that way, check out the following: **The MSE Library** and the **Hutzler Undergraduate Reading Room** both hire graduate students. Many of these jobs are decidedly non-strenuous and let you study while working intermittently. The bad news is that they don't pay very well. Look for job notices online or at the Administrative Office on the Q level (Upper Quad level) of the MSE Library. **The Study Consultant and Accountability Program (SCAP)** (contact: Angela Ruddle at the Office of Academic Advising, 410-516-5506) hires grad students as study consultants for students in danger of failing out of school. Hours are flexible, training time is paid, and the pay is \$10/hour. There is an application and interview process required. Right now SCAP has fewer consultants than they really need. If you have the time, this can be a good way to supplement your income.

Teach Baltimore is actually a volunteer program, but it pays a decent living stipend. This is a seven-week daily program that brings student teachers (both graduate and undergraduate) from three area colleges together with Baltimore students who need help preparing for the math, writing, and reading portions of the Maryland Functional Exams. Contact the Volunteer Services Office (www.jhu.edu/crvs) for more information.

The Center for Talented Youth (CTY, www.jhu.edu/gifted) hires graduate students as instructors and teaching assistants for summer courses in math, science, and the humanities. The hiring process begins in November and lasts until April. Contact the CTY Summer Program Employment Office (410-735-6185, ctysummer@jhu.edu) for more information.

School of Professional Studies in Business and Education (formerly Continuing Studies) courses are sometimes taught by grad students. If interested, you need to speak to the relevant academic division about their hiring policies and application process. The SPSBE offices are in Shaffer Hall. The main office number is 410- 516-7185.

The Office of Recreation (410-516-5229) hires students to work in the new Rec Center, and as instructors for fitness courses. They also offer courses for instructor certification, but after the program you are expected to work at the center for at least a year. Check out their website (www.jhu.edu/~recsport) or call for more information. For listings of other jobs on campus, at other Hopkins facilities, or around town, visit the **Office of Student Employment and Payroll**, 72 Garland Hall, or check the regularly updated job lists online at www.jhu.edu/~stujob. There are usually a variety of opportunities available.

IPS Basics

Website: Use the IPS website (<http://ips.jhu.edu>) as a resource. The staff pages list all of the research interests and specialties of the professors and researchers at the Institute; they are not only good resources for future career goals, but also for potential research projects while at IPS.

Room Reservations: In order to reserve conference rooms or other workspaces at IPS, mark your reservations in the small calendars on the right hand side of the front desk ahead of time. This saves everyone the trouble of scrambling to find a study spot—people can check the calendars to plan their meetings accordingly. If you are using an IPS room, make sure to keep them clean, push in the chairs, and turn out the lights before you leave for the night.

Bagel Monday: Every Monday morning is “Bagel Monday,” where IPS purchases bagels for whoever is working or studying there!

After Hours: In order to work at IPS before or after business hours, you must get your J-Card activated for the 5th floor, as well as for the Wyman Park building. All you have to do is give a photocopy of your card to Mary Jo at the front desk. Your J-Card also grants you access to the library, athletic center, computer lab, copy machines, and more. You can also deposit cash on your card (“J-Cash”) to use at local businesses and on campus.

Parking: After 8:30 pm, the Wyman parking lot is free. Also, you are able to park your car in the circular drive in front of the building after 5 pm.

Delivery: Visit www.campusfoods.com for a list of restaurants that deliver to the Homewood campus—you can view their menus and place your orders online or by phone. Tell them to deliver to 3100 Wyman Park Drive.

Mailboxes & Storage: Storage crates and student mailboxes are located in the computer lab. To use a crate, you'll need to reserve one using the whiteboard located near the mailboxes in the computer lab.

Security Shuttle: If you are studying late, call the Hopkins Security Shuttle to take you home. From 5 pm until 3 am, you can call them to drive you anywhere within a one-mile radius. The phone number is (410) 516-8700 and is also on your J-card.

Information for International Students

Below are some important details and resources international students should be aware of. More information for international students can be found at the website of the Hopkins Office of International Student and Scholar Services, <http://ww2.hu.edu/iss>.

Important Documents and Procedures

Passport: Your passport is your most important form of identification in the U.S. Do not carry it around. However, you'll need it to demonstrate your age in some instances (e.g., to get into bars), unless you have a driver's license with your date of birth. You'll also need it to open a bank account, apply for a credit card or get a cell phone plan.

I20s: You'll get new I20s when your status in the U.S. changes (e.g., you get work authorization). All I20s should be kept safely. These are important immigration papers.

Temporary "Social Security Number": International students are assigned a temporary "Social Security Number" by the university. It will begin with the number 899. This is the ID number given to you by the university to use in lieu of the U.S. social security number. To get a credit card, cell phone plan or other services off-campus you usually need to have a U.S. social security number.

Social Security Card: A social security card is a valid ID that states your name, status in the U.S. and social security number. ONLY when you are employed in the U.S. are you eligible for a social security number. You are NOT eligible if you get a scholarship, but are not employed. To apply for a social security number, you'll need to show the Social Security Administration Office your letter of employment, I20(s) and passport. Obtain your letter of employment from the Office of International Student and Scholar Services if your job is on campus or from a valid employer if you are employed off campus.

CPT (Curricular Practical Training): CPT is the work authorization international students have to obtain for an internship. Detailed rules and required documents are available on the website of the Office of International Student and Scholar Services. CPT is authorized by the abovementioned office on campus, so you can apply about a week before your internship starts.

OPT (Optional Practical Training): OPT is the work authorization international students with a F1 status have to obtain to be permitted to work full time for up to one year after graduation. Detailed rules and required documents are available on the website of the Office of International Student and Scholar Services. OPT is much more complicated so you are advised to apply at least three months before graduation to the Office of International Student and Scholar Services.

Employment: International students are eligible to work on campus for up to 20 hours a week during spring and fall, or more during intersession. International students are only eligible to work off campus after their first year in the U.S. using CPT or OPT.

Hopkins Security Vans: The Security office runs two different types of van services – route vans and off-route vans.

On Demand Escort Vans: Provides students and affiliates with free but limited service within the one-mile service area, between campus and their residence and locations within the East route – Charles Village service area, Monday - Sunday, 5:00 p.m.-3:00 a.m. Call 410-516-8700 to request this service.

Other Transportation Systems

Collegetown Shuttle: Provides free transportation between the campuses of Johns Hopkins, Loyola, College of Notre Dame, Towson, and Goucher for those students. The shuttle also stops at the Towson Town Center mall on the north-bound route. A south-bound route runs on the weekends and stops at Baltimore Penn Station and the Inner Harbor. MTA Buses, Metro, and Light Rail: The primary means of public transportation in Baltimore City; the bus system runs throughout the city and out into the suburbs, and the metro and light rail are primarily located in the southern part of the city. Visit www.mtmaryland.com for schedules and routes. For most of the bus routes, the fare is \$1.60 one-way (exact change is needed), or \$3.50 for an all-day pass. (Use Google's new transit planner (www.google.com/transit) to figure out the best bus routes in Baltimore for wherever you need to go.)

Travel to JHU from the Local Airports

Baltimore-Washington International Airport (BWI) is about 10 miles from downtown Baltimore. Driving time from the airport to the university's Baltimore campuses is approximately 25 minutes. You can visit at www.bwiairport.com for more information on the airport and its terminals.

By Taxi

Transportation by taxi from BWI to the university's Baltimore campuses generally costs between \$30-\$40. Taxis are waiting in the airport terminal for passengers.

By Light Rail

You can take the light rail directly from the airport to Baltimore's Penn (train) Station. Light rail fare is approximately \$3 roundtrip. The service operates Monday through Saturday, 5:13am to 12:45am and Sunday and holidays from 10:43am to 8:43pm.
